



CENTENARY HANDBOOK



TEAMS

1901 Monson Swimming Club was formed. The name came from the Monson Road Baths, which were the headquarters of the Club.

1906 Monson won the Sussex Junior League Water Polo shield. (This was the first time a Club had been entered in both the Kent and Sussex Leagues).

1908 The first Swimming Club of Tunbridge Wells, Cygnus – approached Monson concerning amalgamation. No records show if this happened, but not long after this Cygnus did not feature in any further records.

1921/2/3 Monson won the Kent County Water Polo Senior Championship.







WHAT MONSON MEANS TO ME

"My memories of Monson go back over seventy years – life revolved around the club, swimming and diving. Also home and away matches, the County Championships and having fun travelling on the coach with the Water Polo team!" 1945 September 13th. Special Meeting called to reformulate activities after the Second World War.

1946 Club Championships held.

1947 Membership numbers were back to pre-war levels, and the Junior Section was almost double that of 1939.

1950 Membership numbers topped 200.

1950 Graham Bournes competed in the National Championships in Blackpool.

1950 Start of swimming school with training schedules drawn up by Peter Benians and held on Monday evenings from 7:00 pm – 9:00 pm.

- 1952 Monson placed 2nd in Kent Mens' Diving League and 3rd in Kent League for Water Polo.
- 1955 Graham Bournes won all the Kent County Freestyle Championships, including the Long Distance held in the River Medway.
- 1956 Club badge re-designed from the Otter to the present badge depicting the then Tunbridge Wells crest.
- 1956 Dennis Knight was appointed Club Coach in 1956 a role he held until 1966. He became the Club's first professional Coach in 1974.



he beginning of the 1960's saw our swimmers again entering the National Swimming Championships. Boys and Girls from Monson were also representing Kent County, Southern Counties and English Schools. In 1961 Monson had its first Great Britain swimmer, Gaynor Foy, since Fred Dove in the 1930s.

1961 10 Monson swimmers gained County colours. Stuart Marsh was the first Monson swimmer selected, with the Club Coach, to attend the ASA Advanced Swimming Training Course at Loughborough.

1962 The Junior Water Polo team, in their second year of the competition were the winners of the Southern Counties Junior club water polo championship, Monson being the first club in Kent to win this trophy. The captain of the junior team, David Coleman was appointed the Captain of the Kent County Junior Water Polo team.

WHAT MONSON MEANS TO ME "Monson was an important part of what I am today, helping me to form lifelong relationships with family and friends".

1963 Saw the start of the age group championships which are now part of our swimming year.

During this year, Pat Fleming broke Fred Doves' 1935 100 yards freestyle record with a time of 54.9 seconds.

1965 Monson became one of the founder members of the London League now the Speedo Swimming League. The Club Secretary, Ron Wheeler was one of the prime movers in the setting up of this competition, which is still running today, and competed for nationwide. Worthy of special note in 1965 was the fact that Monson won the Keith Gillman trophy for the annual team race across Dover harbour. The club obtained a notable achievement in the swim when their four swimmers gained the first four places thus obtaining



1966 The senior water polo team won the Norman Beadle knock-out cup beating their old rivals Beckenham in the final. The junior water polo team still holds the record of beating Eton Otters 28-0 in the final of the Southern Counties Championships.

1966 On the 24 September. 1966 under the direction of John Wrapson, the new Club Coach, after many hours of training at Dover and Folkestone, the team from Monson were successful in crossing the English Channel, only just missing the record by 16 minutes. The team were given a civic reception by the Mayor of Tunbridge Wells on their return.

1966 Monson started their first synchronized swimming club sessions.

1966 Under the direction of the new club coach John Wrapson Monson was the first club in the South to run a four day intensive training course.

1967 Six 12 year old Monson swimmers set a record for the youngest team to swim the English Channel.
Channel Swimming Association rules stated you must be 12 years old before you could attempt to swim the channel. This record is still in the Guinness Book of Records today.

During the 1960s a lot of lobbying was carried out to try to persuade the Council to build a new swimming pool. In 1966, the membership peaked at 983 with over 83 children on the waiting list to join the Club.

"Monson was my life - training everyday - hard yes, but brilliant fun. Monson provided my friends, fitness, love of sport and love of life".

International honours came to our officials in 1971. Daphne Geer was appointed the Chaperone to the England team for the Bologna Trophy, David Reeves was the Team Manager for the GB Water Polo Team and Raymond Harris was Captain of the GB World Student Games team. From the new synchronized swimming section Linda Horne, was awarded the Kent County Synchronized Swimming Champion of the Year trophy. The club and age group championships were well supported this year with over 500 entries and 19 new Club records.

1973 During 1973, Linda Horne the synchronized swimmer, was invited to join the Great Britain synchronized swimming squad. In the Four Nations competition in Paris, and later that year, she competed in the first World Championships held in Belgrade.

1974 July 13th – The opening of the new pool in St John's Road and the Club laid on a display of all aspects of our sport to an invited audience. Now with a diving pit, the diving section was able to start again under the direction of Al Williams, the Great Britain Team Coach.

Early in 1972 another Monson first. Who would have thought that a swimming club could produce a first class professional pantomime in our old pool. All sections of the club participated in the pantomime 'Mother Goose', under the production and direction of Derek Horne. He developed acts of comedy and the aquatic displays and effects were a delight.



1976 With all the new facilities, 1976 was the time when the Club once again started to get some better results in the swimming world. Twenty new girls and twelve new boys club records were recorded in 1976. Paul Thornby was the first Club member to go under 60 seconds for the 100 metres freestyle and Gavin Wells beat the record for the 4 x 100 metres Individual Medley by 48 seconds. In the National Swimming championships, our Girls won a silver medal in the 16/17 years 4 x 100m. freestyle.

1977 The Club had to introduce a permanent waiting list. Too much pressure had been put on the Club Coach and his assistant to find places in the early classes. This resulted in the Club now having to hire facilities at the Tonbridge School pool to

accommodate Top Squad, giving them a realistic amount of training time and leaving space on a Monday evening for more members to participate in the training. The same year, the Club introduced a Monson Swimming Club Highboard Diving Championship. Also in this year, Monson Synchro girls wiped the board at the County Championships with Sonia Brunton and Kay Bradley winning the Senior and Junior titles between them and Brian Hunt won the National Lifesaving Championship.

1978 Pride of place in 1978 must go to Gavin Wells, another home produced swimmer, who achieved international honours by being selected to represent GB in the European Youth Championships which were held in Florence. Also in 1978 Daphne Geer had been selected as Ladies Chaperone to the

English Swimming team at the Commonwealth Games in Edmonton, Canada and then for the Great Britain team competing in the World Championships in Berlin.

he 80's must go down in the history of Monson as the decade when our presence was felt at Kent County, National and International levels. All the hard work over the last four years by the Club Coach, Mick Geer, was now paying dividends.

1980 Sadly in 1980 Fred Dove, the first
Tunbridge Wells Olympian died. He
would have been so proud to have
known that Suki Brownsdon, the
first Monson Club swimmer to go
through the Club system from learn
to swim, lengths, Top Squad, County,
National and International level had
been selected to represent her
country at the Olympic Games in
Moscow. The same year Suki became
the first British swimmer to win a
Gold medal at the European Junior
Championships.

1981 Water polo was on the up again with three teams in the top half of the Kent County Water Polo league. In the Kent County Championships, our entries were 77% up on the previous year. Our swimmers reached 35 finals breaking 8 County records. In 1981, the membership was again on the increase with over 788 members.

Another first for Monson – Peter Lerpiniere won a Gold medal in the 100 metres Backstroke at the European Police Championships.

1982 The Club had its best results for many years in the Speedo Swimming League.


Monson qualified for the National finals coming 6th overall.
